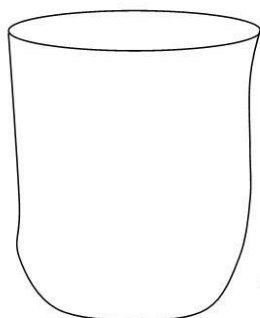


## Sewing pattern for Pouches for Wildlife care



## Design for Inner and Outer Pouches - different sizes

**Inner Pouches:** Material - preferably older flannelette or other soft material that does not shed any lint the joeys might digest. (Just like any other infant our tiny marsupial babies like to suckle - e.g. on their pouch.) Older flannelette is also still soft and does not damage the delicate skin of tiny joeys.



- Seams must be on the outside, so the little joeys don't entangle themselves in threads

- rounded edges at the bottom, to avoid that a joey head or foot gets stuck

### **A: For Possums, Sugar Gliders, Tiny Wallabies (2 sizes)**

- Height: 25 cm - Width: 15 cm or
- Height: 30 cm - Width: 30 cm

### **B: For velvet Eastern Grey Kangaroos, older Wallabies**

- Height: 40 cm - Width: 30 cm

### **C: For older, now rather spoiled Eastern Grey Kangaroos joeys (2 sizes)**

- Height: 70 cm - Width: 60 cm or

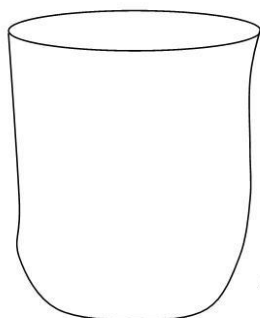
**Outer Pouches** - just add 5 cm to the size of an inner pouch:

Our barely furred marsupials cannot regulate their own body temperature. In the Wild they are nice and snug in mummy's pouch. However, in human care they need extra protection. Good materials are lambs wool, e.g. from old mattress protectors, old baby blankets or cotton sleeping bags.

Woollen knitted beanie or toddler training pants with sewn-up leg holes are ideal for possums to be warm and cosy

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
